Message from the Pastor

Dear sisters and brothers in Christ,

I found myself this past month at a memorial service for a beloved mentor and teacher from my home church. I found myself gathered with so many persons who helped raise and shape me as a youth in that church. Sitting right in front of me was my youth choir director and I found myself filled with memories of choir practice. She always challenged us to not only capture the proper notes but to also capture the meaning of the words we were singing.

When I think of June one of my first thoughts is of Father's Day and I was remembering that one of the first anthems we ever did in my youth choir days was "This Is My Father's World." I can still hear her saying, "You can't sing the words if you don't know the words purpose. Who wants to read the first verse out loud?" It really is a great song. Do you remember the words?

This is my Father's world, and to my listening ears all nature sings, And round me rings the music of the spheres.

This is my Father's world: I rest me in the thought

Of rocks and trees, of skies and seas; his hand the wonders wrought.

This is my Father's world, the birds their carols raise, The morning light, the lily white, declare their maker's praise. This is my Father's world: he shines in all that's fair; in the rustling grass I hear him pass; he speaks to me everywhere.

This is my Father's world: why should my heart be sad?

The Lord is King; let the heaven's ring! God reigns; let the earth be glad!

What a wondrous reminder of the true celebration of God our Father, who creates the beauty of the earth, who walks with us through life, and who serves as our King so we might know His kingdom!


The original poem was penned by Maltbie D. Babcock who served as a Presbyterian Minister at Brick Church in NY. He was known for taking nearly daily walks along a cliff that overlooked Ontario Lake. As he departed for his walks he would often remark, "I'm going out to see my Father's world." The original poem had 16 four-line stanzas and it was after his death that it was adapted by Franklin L. Sheppard to be set to music.

Something I learned this week is that Babcock died at the age of 42. As I both approach my 42 birthday and remember my beloved mentor and teacher, I am drawn to their insight about my Father's world and the need to be out in it. Their lives remind me that it is not about the years we get, but what we do with those years that matters most. As we enter the month of June how will you honor our Holy Parent?

Will you go out into the world to see what beauty you can find? Will you persevere through a wrong, knowing God is still King? Will you face our mortal nature by remembering that our hearts should not be sad, for God reigns in an eternal kingdom? I implore you to hear the wisdom offered from these wonderful persons and challenge yourself to:

- 1. Know the meaning of your words before you sing or speak them.
- 2. Go out and see our Father's world.

Who knows where we might be led, who we may encounter or the lives that will brush up against each other as we walk?
